

VOTING

In order to vote in a federal election, you must be a Canadian citizen, be at least 18 years old on election day (October 21, 2019), and prove your identity and address. The following provides information on voting in the federal election.

REGISTERING TO VOTE

You can find out if you are registered to vote on the Elections Canada website (www.elections.ca). If you are not registered, you can register to vote in person at your assigned polling station on election day.

WAYS TO VOTE:

Vote on Election Day

Vote at your assigned polling station (on your voter's information card) on Monday, October 21 from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Bring your voter's information card and identification.

HOW MANY SEATS DOES A PARTY NEED TO WIN?

The Canadian House of Commons has 338 members. **To win a majority government, a party needs 170 seats.** A minority government is won by the party that gets less than 170, but still has the most seats.

WHERE TO VOTE

You can vote at your polling station listed on your voter information card. If you have not received a voter information card, you can enter your postal code on the Elections Canada website (www.elections.ca) to find your polling station.

IDENTIFICATION

To vote in the federal election you have to prove your identity and address. There are three ways to do this:

1

Show one of these pieces of ID:

a) Your driver's licence; or **b)** any other card issued by a Canadian government (federal, provincial/territorial or local) with your photo, name and current address

2

Show two pieces of I.D. – both must have your name and at least one must have your current address. Elections Canada website (www.elections.ca) has a list of acceptable pieces of I.D.

3

If you don't have ID – you can still vote if you declare your identity and address in writing and have someone (with identification) who knows you and who is assigned to your polling station vouch for you.
